




## INSTRUCTIONS

Listed below are a number of plants and animals you might encounter on your walk. Tick each one off as you see it and draw a picture in the space provided. There are also some clues as to where and when you might find them!


SYCAMORE TREE		YES <input type="checkbox"/>	NO <input type="checkbox"/>
	<p>The Sycamore is a fast growing shady tree with a massive trunk. They are deciduous which means they lose their leaves in winter.</p> <p>In Autumn, its bunches of small flowers develop into winged seeds or 'helicopters' which spin away from the tree in the wind.</p>		


WREN		YES <input type="checkbox"/>	NO <input type="checkbox"/>
	<p>The Wren is a tiny brown bird. It is dumpy with a fine bill, quite long legs and toes.</p> <p>It can be seen all year round in thick undergrowth where it likes to feed on insects and spiders.</p> <p>Its sound is a loud ringing, warbling song.</p>		


SNAILS		YES <input type="checkbox"/>	NO <input type="checkbox"/>
	<p>Snails can be 8cm long and are most active between March and October.</p> <p>They feed on vegetable matter.</p> <p>In winter they hibernate in groups under stones and in crevices of trees.</p>		


GREY SQUIRREL		YES <input type="checkbox"/>	NO <input type="checkbox"/>
	<p>The Grey Squirrel can be seen all year round but are more active January - June.</p> <p>They eat nuts and seeds. During autumn they bury nuts and acorns.</p> <p>Their home, called a drey, is made from twigs and dry leaves.</p>		

ASH TREE		YES <input type="checkbox"/>	NO <input type="checkbox"/>
	<p>The Ash is deciduous so it loses its leaves in winter, leaving behind clusters of black velvety buds.</p> <p>They prefer full light at all times and do not like being crowded by other trees.</p> <p>Very little else will grow under Ash.</p>		

ROBIN		YES <input type="checkbox"/>	NO <input type="checkbox"/>
	<p>The Robin can be found in gardens and woodland all year round.</p> <p>It is 14cm in length and feeds on insects, seeds and berries.</p> <p>They nest in holes - either in a tree, wall or sheds.</p>		

RED ADMIRAL		YES <input type="checkbox"/>	NO <input type="checkbox"/>
	<p>The Red Admirable can be found between May and October above hedgerows and meadows.</p> <p>It feeds on nectar and windfallen fruits like apples and plums.</p> <p>Its wingspan is 64mm.</p>		

RABBIT		YES <input type="checkbox"/>	NO <input type="checkbox"/>
	<p>Rabbits can be seen all year round.</p> <p>They live in burrows, known as 'warrens', eat grass and farm crops.</p> <p>When disturbed they flash their 'powder-puff' tails as a warning signal to other rabbits of danger.</p>		

BLUE BELLS		YES <input type="checkbox"/>	NO <input type="checkbox"/>
	<p>Blue Bells can be found in woodlands between April and June.</p> <p>Blue Bells flower early to make use of the light before the trees above become covered in leaves and block out the sun.</p>
