1	Welcome and introduction.	SH
2	The notes of the last meeting held on 25 th September 2017 were approved. Matters arising were discussed and substantive items are covered in the agenda.	
3	Presentation by East Riding of Yorkshire Council External Funding Team	CW/CL
	Claire Watts provided a comprehensive summary of the role, management and scope of the External Funding Team, circulating handouts and leaflets which explained and outlined different aspects of the service in which members may have an interest. Described European Social Fund (ESF) and other similar funding	

	<p>opportunities eg, the ERDF and place-based growth for community safety.</p> <p>CW emphasised their role in supporting local business, one which the creation of Local Economic Partnerships (LEPs) had expanded.</p> <p>TM asked about the potential for an ESF bid for Humber-wide bid. It was agreed that a Humber-wide bid would be more sensible than an East Riding of Yorkshire based “skills for offender” bid as it would reflect how prisoner releases worked across the area.</p> <p>RWB - LEP have started to build a justice sub-group (one of the first in the country). This is predicated on the idea (amongst others) that meaningful employment leads to massive drops in re-offending.</p> <p>KM – MoJ contract has a very good service from the provider – needs and wants are very complex.</p> <p>RWB recommended that the appropriate mechanism for applying for cross-Humber funding should be the LEP.</p> <p>The Group agreed with this and Robbie/Probation/Public Health reps will report back as appropriate</p>	RWB

	<p>MEH summarised the process, themes and background of both the Joint Strategic Intelligence Assessment and the Crime & Disorder Strategy which covers the East Riding of Yorkshire.</p> <p>The Board approved the strategy as presented with the following comments /amendments:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - The term “DV” should be replaced with Domestic Abuse (DA) (Supt Gadd). - There should be mention made of rurality of the area and the distinctiveness of certain parts of the area should be emphasised (DF will provide an advisory paragraph). - Some mention could be made of the distinctiveness of demographics, particularly reference to older people. <p>MEH will circulate the document with those changes. He thanked Nigel Brignall for producing the JSIA and also the group for ‘turning around’ the comments and amendments in short order.</p>	DF MEH

	<p>Approved applications:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> i) Goole Community Group - £8,900 ii) Hornsea Town Council - £10,000 iii) Hull FC - £10,000 	

	<p>iv) Gilberdyke District Leisure Association - £4700 (Group has six months to raise balance of funding needed)</p> <p>v) New Life Support - £8,888.40</p> <p>NOTE: Applications for CCTV were, in general, deferred until the CSP can produce a guidance note for applicants covering basic principles for bidders.</p> <p>In total, £42,488.40 of funding was approved from a total “applied for” sum of £132,161.61.</p>	
7	<p>Police and Crime Commissioner Funding – Phase 1&2</p> <p>Funding applications: recommendations and consideration</p>	
	<p>The Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) has made funding available to the East Riding Community Safety Partnership. In 2017/18 this amounted to £0.831m. The funding is in two equal phases both of which are allocated by the CSP. Applications for Phase 1&2 funding were sought and evaluated. Eight applications were received for Phase One funding. These were¹:</p> <p>i) Fairway Process (ASB team, ERYC) - £100k per annum for three years</p> <p>ii) Neighbourhood Watch (ERYC) - £15,661 per annum for three years</p> <p>iii) Children’s DV Service (ERYC) - £31,100 per annum for three years</p> <p>iv) East Riding Adult Safeguarding Board - £29,410 per annum for three years</p> <p>v) East Riding Children’s Safeguarding Board £27,000 for one year</p> <p>vi) Positive lifestyles – Sport Play and Arts service - £35,900 per annum for three years</p> <p>vii) Youth Offending Service (ERYC) - £80,398 per annum for three years</p> <p>viii) Don’t Look Back – Prison mentoring – Hull and East Yorkshire MIND</p> <p>All applications apart from item viii) were approved.</p> <p>Please note that the funding for the Positive Lifestyles was incorrectly listed as £35,900 for the three years not for each year in the agenda papers.</p> <p>Five applications were received for Phase 2 funding. These were:</p> <p>i) Volunteer service – ERVAS - £26,273 per annum for three years</p> <p>ii) Low cost gardening service – Green team - £30,000 for one</p>	

¹ All applications were subjected to a rigorous ‘pre-CSP’ assessment process – they were required to reach a ‘score threshold’ before submission to the CSP Board

	<p>year</p> <p>iii) Intensive engagement project – NACRO - £84,610 for one year</p> <p>iv) Risk taking roadshow, Youth and Family Support service - £32,875 for two years</p> <p>v) Strategic Review Officer for CSP (ERYC) - £31,225 for 15 months.</p> <p>All the above applications for Phase Two funding were approved.</p> <p>The total cost of applications approved for Phase 1 is £319,469. The total cost of applications approved for Phase 2 is £257,529.</p> <p><i>Post meeting note:</i> The Office of the PCC has clarified that monies approved for Phase 1 funding can only be definitively approved from April 2018 – March 31st 2019. This is because the Home Office had, at the time of the discussion, not confirmed three yearly funding for the Policing Service budget. It is expected that further confirmation will be issued as soon as possible. The position has not changed from the position confirmed in the first instance in 2012 (the inception of the “PCC system”). However, the PCC’s office will undertake as far as possible, to confirm a three year position to assist with service and project planning. DF will contact the partnership when further clarification is issued.</p>	DF
8	Scrutiny of Phase One Project evaluation forms	
	<p>Members agreed that the detailed documents were very useful for deriving learning points from ongoing project and service work. However, they also agreed that some further attempt to distil these positive and negative learning points could be made to make the agenda item less unwieldy and useful to CSP priorities. Max Hough agreed to examine this and bring a piece of work to a future meeting.</p>	MEH
9	Reducing Reoffending Board (paper)	
	<p>TM outlined some of the issues facing the Board and the group agreed that it needed extra momentum. All agreed that the commitment and enthusiasm of the Community Rehabilitation Company (CRC) would be required in leading the proposed group into a new strategic direction.</p> <p>The refocused Board will meet again in January and will report back on a refreshed strategy to the CSP when the document is ready.</p> <p>PJA also pointed out that further work was being done on reporting mechanisms and strategic direction through the embryonic Domestic Abuse Steering Group which will report to the CSP and both Safeguarding Boards.</p>	<p>TM</p> <p>Amy Gilbert</p> <p>MEH</p>

10	Briefing Papers/Standing Items from Members	
	<p>i) Community Trigger – PCC office is doing some national work – focus is on this through the national group of PCCs. Also, North Lincolnshire seems to be a good practice area.</p> <p>ii) National Probation Service Update - KM advised that MAPPA continues to be very well supported. There were some process findings in the recent serious case review but MAPPA had taken defensible actions.</p> <p>iii) CRC – Deferred</p> <p>iv) ASG Board – peer review – no longer undertake SCRs: they are now known as “Safeguarding Adults Reviews”. Working with HFRS on ‘hoarding’ protocol, vulnerabilities, and other items. PJA asked whether Public Protection services were involved – MC confirmed that they were.</p> <p>v/vi) Children’s Safeguarding Board update and Child Sexual Exploitation – undertaken partner self-assessments SG board (children) – have agreed how they are taking that forward. Received a helpful update from the recent inspection. Also a presentation about Bridlington South project. CSE – one of the priorities is child sexual abuse including exploitation. Also received a presentation from the police at a recent group meeting Making sure we keep emphasis on our priorities. Appreciate there’s exploitation but increasingly, it’s criminal exploitation rather than sexual.</p> <p>“County Lines” becoming a problem – larger criminal gangs using <i>cuckooing</i> tactics – use of social media means that they can cover their tracks very easily and quickly.</p> <p>vii) Modern Day Slavery - PJA summarised the latest position regarding modern day slavery - -trained over 500 staff on when something doesn’t ‘feel right’. PJA asked about representation in Humber slavery partnership. This is one of the stronger partnerships at the table and it is Humber-wide. All referral mechanisms are set up through the partnership MDS 1 (form) to Superintendent Gadd.</p>
