The evidence produced for this application route suggest highway rights existed at the times the various pieces of evidence were created. Whilst no single piece is conclusive of status, when considered together evidence leans towards rights of Restricted Byway. On the balance of probabilities it is suggested such highway rights existed.

- a) The Bishop Soil Enclosure Award of 1767 names and shows the claimed route as Middle Lane, a carriage road.
- b) Renamed Sleights Lane, the application route is not maintainable at the public expense, although a section immediately adjoining it was adopted by Howden District Highways Committee as recorded in minutes dated 12th April 1958.
- c) Ordnance Survey maps from 1855 onwards all depict the route, initially naming it as Middle or Long Lane and from 1910 as Sleights Lane.
- d) Inland Revenue Finance Act Valuation records show the application route was not part of a Hereditament nor subject of a valuation deduction. Likewise, Land Registry mapping extracts indicate the land has not been registered. This is considered to support the proposition that the application route was a public highway.
- e) Bryant's maps of East Yorkshire published for public use supports d).
- f) No evidence is available to indicate the application route, which is a cul de sac, has been in public use for mechanically propelled vehicles, such use being confined to visitors to one property i.e. Greaves End, otherwise landowners accessing fields with agricultural machines.
- g) In the event that motor vehicular rights have not been extinguished, the applicant opines the cul de sac route is clearly more conducive to and indeed used by the public for horse riding and walking rather than by motor vehicles and so would meet the criterion for being recorded on the definitive map and statement as a restricted byway.
